Christmas Evening was spent on a night club tour that included dinner ending with the Don Ho Show. It was truly a night to remember.

"Why don't you get an electric garage door opener rather than struggling with this piece of junk?" I commented to my mom and dad as I witnessed them struggling to get the garage door open. The look from my dad said it all, "Are you nuts! Why would we waste our money on something like that?" And Mom scoffed, "Gwen, don't be silly."

The previous winter, mom and dad had moved from the farm to Swift Current and into a house with a detached garage that had a very stubborn, old fashioned, turn the knob and pull up garage door. My dad having grown up on the farm, and both parents having lived through the thirties had the mentality of making do with what you had and definitely not splurging on anything deemed unnecessary.

Our Christmases were always a celebration of family, and this Christmas was to be no different, with my sister, Karen, coming home from Calgary and the rest of the extended family all getting together for Christmas day. This Christmas tradition dated back to the 1920s when the Wells and Lightfoot families would get together for Christmas dinner at 2, Christmas supper at 6 and a late night snack near midnight (turkey buns and plenty of goodies). Oh how I miss those days of overeating and not feeling the least bit guilty.

I digress...as Christmas drew near, we pondered over what to get mom and dad for Christmas. I (not sure if it was me, but I always love to take credit for the good ideas) suggested, "What about an electric garage door opener?"

And the planning began... Karen (armed with the remote control) would suggest to mom and dad that she would love to come to our place for a visit. Meanwhile my husband, Lorne, would meet my brother, Alan, at the house. They would install the garage door opener and then hide in the garage so they would be able to witness the opening of the gift.

Fast forward three hours. When I got the call that the mission was accomplished, I gave the nod to Karen, and she quickly said that they should get going. With Karen sitting in the backseat, off they went.

As they approached the garage, dad stopped the car and started to get out of the car to open the garage door. Karen pressed the remote button.

Seeing the garage door going up, Dad, known for his occasional, well placed, colourful expletives exclaimed, "What the hell?" and got back in the car.

Karen then pressed the button and the door went down. Mom and dad both sat dumbfounded. When dad started to get out of the car again, Karen raised the door.

No longer able to contain her giggles, Karen exclaimed, "Merry Christmas Mom and Dad!"

Lorne and Alan came out of the garage laughing. "You should have seen your faces! Merry Christmas!"

"Well, I'll be damned," Dad exclaimed as he drove the car into the garage.

38 years later, we still enjoy telling the Christmas story of, *The Christmas Gift That Kept on Being Opened*!"

Loretta's favourite memories are of the Christmas Eve Sunday School Services at her church. 'Dressed in our Christmas best we sang carols, recited special verses and made our parents proud. Then with our goodie bag in hand we went home, sang more Christmas carols and opened our gifts.'

One very special Christmas memory was the year we decided to give our little grandsons drum sets. Gifts

were opened, as was tradition on Christmas Eve, except for the drums. Wisdom told us it would be a good idea to let the drums be their gift from Santa on Christmas morning. After everyone was settled for the night Santa set them up by the tree and then we went to bed anticipating their excitement in the morning.

In the morning as we watched our "Little Drummer Boys" we felt much satisfaction and thought we had found the perfect gift. The boys, dressed in matching pyjamas and slippers were like two little elves who would disappear and reappear to drum up a storm. However, later that day as the drumming got louder and longer, Santa (Grandpa) was heard chuckling and with a twinkle in his eyes said to the parents, "Sure glad those drums are going home with you." by Idella Harder

Growing up on our little farm in the 1950's and early 1960's we did the usual things that involved kids around Christmas. This was especially true when my many cousins and I got together at the grandparents' houses (dad's side on Christmas Day, mom's side on Boxing Day). There was tobogganing down snow drifts (sometimes on sheets of cardboard), skating on sloughs, fox and goose, and other outdoor activities. The meals were simple, usually consisting of cabbage borscht, baked ham, homemade bread and buns. Because of the numbers, people had to eat in shifts. On the home front, we had modest means so the tree was only about three feet high. Gifts were not wrapped as that was considered wasteful. There were few decorations and lights. Dozens of received Christmas cards were hanging on strings leading across the living room. On Christmas Eve my sister and I would each bring a chair and a mixing bowl into the living room and be sent off to bed. The next morning, magically, the bowls were full of treats (nuts/peanuts/candy/ an orange/a few small trinkets or toys). One year I found a hockey puck in my bowl. Larger gifts were hung over the chair or placed underneath the chair.

One of my big concerns was that we didn't have a fireplace. When Santa came down the chimney, how could he get out of the oil space heater that was used to heat our home? -----by Mel Friesen
